




#### <u>Titanic - The Maiden Voyage</u>

On April 10<sup>th</sup>, 1912, the Titanic, the world's largest ship left Southampton, England on her maiden voyage, the destination was New York City.

The White Star Line was one of the greatest ships to ever sail the seas. A legend before she sailed, passengers were a mixture of the world's wealthiest and immigrants packed into the lower decks and steerage.

They said she was the safest ship ever built, so safe that the ship only carried 20 lifeboats, enough to provide safety for only half of her passengers.

The ship held 2,200 passengers, many questioned the discrepancy but were assured that boat was unsinkable.

#### Titanic - The Journey

On April 14<sup>th</sup>, 1912, the Titanic, the world's largest ship struck an iceberg. The White Star Line only carried 20 lifeboats. This was not enough for all the men, women and children on board. Women and children from First Class were loaded on to the lifeboats first. The wealthy were offered lifejackets but life expectancy would be minutes rather than hours given the below freezing temperatures of the water.

As the forward portion of the boat sank, passengers scrambled for their lives. They were clinging together in clusters, like swarming bees but nothing would save them. The boat began to sink, the front under water and the end at a sixty-five degree angle.

The great ship slowly slid beneath the waters, two hours and forty minutes after impact.

#### Titanic - The Ship

Titanic was 882 feet **9 inches** (269.06 m) long with a maximum breadth of **92 feet 6 inches** (**28.19 m**). The total height, measured from base of the keel to the top of the bridge, was 104 feet (32 m). She measured 46,328 gross register tons and with a draught of 34 feet 7 inches (10.54 m), she displaced 52,310 tons.

#### <u>Titanic</u> Stories of Tragedy and Survival


The Titanic was one of the most famous oceanic disasters in modern history.

On April 17<sup>th</sup>, 1912, two days after the RMS Titanic sunk, the cable ship CS Mackay-Bennett left Halifax harbour on a somber journey to start recovering the bodies of those who lost their lives. 1,500 died on that fateful night but only 333 victims were ever found. Entire families perished in the disaster with victims as young as two years old, others survived, over 700 survivors lived to tell their tale.

#### <u>Titanic</u> A Deep Sea Grave

A century has sailed by since the luxurious white steam liner plunged into the ocean floor. More than 1,500 people lost their lives and in the decades since her demise, the Titanic has inspired countless books and several notable films. Titanic's creators believed they had built an unsinkable ship that could not be defeated by the laws of nature, unfortunately, this was not the case.

The Titanic was never removed from the ocean, it has been said that it is much too fragile. Many species of marine animals have also made Titanic their home.
